The Columbia Charter Township Board of Trustees adopted an Ordinance of Columbia Charter Township, Jackson County, Michigan being the COLUMBIA TOWNSHIP CEMETERY ORDI-NANCE, Ordinance No.

This Ordinance is to provide for the regulation relating to the operation, control, and management of the Township cemeteries, including sale of lots, purchase price, grave opening, markers, internment regulation, ground maintenance, forfeiture of lots, repurchase of lots, records, cemetery hours, sexton, and general rules. The Ordinance provides misdemeanor penalties for violation, including a fine up to \$100 and/or 90 days in jail.

Effective date: Thirty (30) days after publication

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VILLAGE OF ADDISON BURN ORDINANCE

ORDINANCE NO: __2025-01___

Village of Addison, Lenawee County, Michigan

An ordinance to secure the public peace, health, safety and welfare of the residents and property owners of the Village of Addison, Lenawee County, Michigan, a municipal corporation, to rescind the existing Open Fire Ordinance 1994-1, and to enact a new Ordinance to control and regulate outdoor burning of materials within the Village of Addison; to provide penalties for the violation of this ordinance and to repeal any ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict here-

THE VILLAGE OF ADDISON, LENAWEE COUNTY, ORDAINS:

SECTION 1: PURPOSE 1.00 Purpose.

This ordinance is intended to promote public health, safety and welfare and to safeguard the health, comfort, living conditions, safety and welfare of the citizens of VILLAGE OF ADDISON by regulating the air pollution and fire hazards of outdoor burning.

SECTION 2: APPLICABILITY 2.00 Applicability.

This ordinance applies to all outdoor burning within the VILLAGE OF ADDI-SON, Lenawee County, Michigan

- 2.1. This ordinance does not apply to grilling or cooking food using charcoal, wood, propane or natural gas in cooking or grilling appliances.
- 2.2. This ordinance does not apply to burning for the purpose of generating heat in a stove, furnace, fireplace or other heating device within a building used for human or animal habitation.

 2.3. This ordinance does not apply to the use of propane, acetylene, natural

gas, gasoline or kerosene in a device intended for heating, construction or maintenance activities.

SECTION 3: SEVERABILITY

3.00 Severability.Should any portion of this ordinance be declared unconstitutional or invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder of this ordinance shall not be affected.

SECTION 4: DEFINITIONS 4.00 Definitions.

- 4.1. "Campfire" means a small outdoor fire intended for recreation or cooking but not including a fire intended for disposal of waste wood or refuse.
- 4.2. "Clean wood" means natural wood which has not been painted, varnished or coated with a similar material: has not been pressure treated with preservatives; and does not contain resins or glues as in plywood or other composite wood products.
- 4.3. "Construction and demolition waste" means building waste materials, including but not limited to waste shingles, insulation, lumber, treated wood, painted wood, wiring, plastics, packaging, and rubble that results

from construction, remodeling, repair, and demolition operations on a house, commercial or industrial building, or other structure.

4.4. "Fire Chief" means the Chief of Addison Fire Department or other person designated by the Fire Chief.4.5. "Municipality" means a county,

township, city, or village.

- 4.6. "Open burning" means kindling or maintaining a fire where the products of combustion are emitted directly into the ambient air without passing through a stack or a chimney. This includes burning on the ground or in a burn barrel
- 4.7. "Outdoor burning" means open burning or burning in an outdoor wood furnace or patio woodburning unit.
- 4.8. "Patio wood-burning unit" means a chiminea, patio warmer, or other portable wood-burning device used for outdoor recreation and/or heating. 4.9. "Refuse" means any waste material except trees, logs, brush, stumps, leaves, grass. clippings, and other vegetative matters.

SECTION 5: GENERAL PROHIBITION ON OPEN BURNING

5.00 General prohibition on open burning.

Open burning is prohibited in VIL-LAGE OF ADDISON, unless the burning is specifically permitted by this ordinance.

SECTION 6: OPEN BURNING OF REFUSE

- 6.1. Open burning of refuse from a commercial or industrial establishment is prohibited.
- 6.2 Open burning of the following materials is prohibited:
- 6.2.1 Construction and demolition waste except for clean wood.
- 6.2.2 Hazardous substances including but not limited to batteries, household chemicals, pesticides, used oil, gasoline, paints, varnishes, and solvents.
- 6.3.3 Furniture and appliances.
- 6.3.4 Tires.
- 6.3.5 Any plastic materials in large quantities including but not limited to nylon, PVC, ABS, polystyrene or urethane foam, and synthetic fabrics, plastic films and plastic containers.
 6.3.6 Treated or painted wood includ-
- ing but not limited to plywood, composite wood products or other wood products that are painted, varnished or treated with preservatives.
- 6.3.7 No outside waste of any type or character brought into the village for burning.

SECTION 7: OPEN BURNING OF TREES, LOGS, BRUSH, STUMPS, LEAVES, AND GRASS CLIPPINGS IS PROHIBITED

7.00 Regulations regarding burning trees, logs, brush, stumps, leaves, and grass clippings.

7.1.1. Except for campfires and fires in a Patio Wood Burning Unit, a notice

must be given to the Addison Fire Department in accordance with Section 13 of this ordinance prior to opening burning under this section when the ground is not snow-covered. 7.1.2 Except for barbecue, gas, and charcoal grills, no open burning shall be undertaken during periods when the Governor of Michigan has issued a burning ban applicable to the area. 7.1.3. All allowed campfires and fires in a Patio Wood Burning Unit shall be conducted in a safe, nuisance-free manner, when wind and weather conditions minimize adverse effects and do not create a health hazard or a vis-

ibility hazard on roadways, railroads

or airfields. campfires shall be con-

ducted in conformance with all local

and state fire protection regulations.

Campfires shall not exceed 60" diameter by 32" high including flame. 7.1.4. At all times Campfires shall be constantly attended and supervised by a competent person of at least eighteen (18) years of age until the fire is extinguished and is cold. The person shall have readily available for use such fire extinguishing equipment as may be necessary for the total con-

trol of the fire.
7.1.5 No materials may be burned upon any street, curb, gutter or sidewalk or on the ice of a lake, pond, stream or water body.

8.00 Patio wood-burning units.

A patio wood-burning unit may be installed in accordance with all the following provisions:

- 8.1. The patio wood-burning unit shall not be used to burn refuse.
- 8.2. The patio wood-burning unit shall burn only clean wood.
- 8.3. The patio wood-burning unit shall be located at least 25 feet from the nearest structure which is not on the same property as the patio wood-burning unit.
- 8.4. The patio wood-burning unit shall not cause a nuisance to neighbors.

SECTION 9: YARD WASTE 9.00 Yard Waste.

9.1. As an alternative option, natural yard waste, except for construction materials, may be transported to the DPW/Fire Department for controlled burns administered by the DPW/Fire Department, exclusively for village residents and limited to village ard waste only.

SECTION 10: BURNING NOTICE 10.00 Burning Notice.

10.1. Campfires or a fire in a Patio Wood Burning Unit do not require notification provided that the fire complies with all other applicable provisions of this ordinance.

10.2. When the weather conditions warrant, the Fire Chief may temporarily suspend open burning.

10.3 Emergency Conditions: The Fire Chief or designated representative is authorized and directed to declare

when a state of emergency exists with respect to fires within the village to prohibit all outdoor burning. Such emergencies shall be posted at the village of Addison office and such other normal posting locations within the village.

SECTION 11: LIABILITY 11.00 Liability.

A person utilizing or maintaining an outdoor fire shall be responsible for all fire suppression costs and any other liability resulting from damage caused by the fire.

SECTION 12: RIGHT OF ENTRY AND INSPECTION

12.00 Right of entry and inspection. The Fire Chief or any authorized officer, agent, employee or representa-

cer, agent, employee or representative of the VILLAGE OF ADDISON who presents credentials may inspect any property for the purpose of ascertaining compliance with the provisions of this ordinance.

SECTION 13: ENFORCEMENT AND PENALTIES

13.00 Enforcement and penalties.

13.1. The Fire Chief and authorized Village of Addison Ordinance Officers are authorized to enforce the provisions of this ordinance.

13.2. A violation of this Ordinance is a municipal civil infraction, for which the fine shall be not more than \$100.00 for the first offense within a three year period, \$200.00 for a second offense within a three year period, \$400.00 for a third offense within a three year period and for a subsequent offense within a three year period, and such fine shall be in addition to all other costs, attorney fees, damages, expenses, and other remedies as provided by law. For purposes of this section, "subsequent offense" means a violation of the provisions of this Ordinance committed by the same person for the same property within three (3) years of a previous violation of a previous violation of the same provision of this Ordinance for which said person admitted responsibility or was adjudicated to be responsible. provided, however, that offenses committed on subsequent days within a period of one week following the issuance of a citation for a first offense shall be considered separate first offenses.

13.3. In addition to pursuing a municipal civil infraction proceeding pursuant to subsection A hereof, the Township may also initiate an appropriate action in a court of competent jurisdiction seeking injunctive, declaratory, or other equitable relief to enforce or interpret this Ordinance or any provision of the Ordinance.

13.4. All remedies available to the Village under this Ordinance and Michigan law shall be deemed to be cumulative and not exclusive.

13.5. Each and every day during

which a violation of this Ordinance shall exist shall be deemed to be a separate offense.

13.6. Any person, firm or entity that assists with or enables the violation of this Ordinance shall be responsible for aiding and abetting, and shall be considered to have violated the provision of this Ordinance involved for which such aiding and abetting occurred. Furthermore, any attempt to violate this Ordinance shall be deemed a violation of the provision of this Ordinance involved as if the violation had been successful or completed.

RESOLUTION TO RESCIND OPEN FIRE ORDINANCE (Ordinance 1994-1) AND ENACT A REPLACEMENT ORDINANCE

Whereas the state of Michigan recently has issued new criteria for open burning through the Department of Environmental Quality (EAGL); and Whereas, the Village of Addison has not revised its Open Fire Ordinance (Ordinance 1994-1) since December 1987: and

Whereas the VILLAGE OF ADDISON desires to bring its burning ordinance into compliance with the practices recommended by the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality as its Outdoor Burning Ordinance; and

Whereas the existing Ordinance 1994-1 (Open Fire Ordinance) must be rescinded before the new ordinance may be adopted.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the VILLAGE OF ADDISON that:

The Open Fire Ordinance of 1994, also known as Ordinance 1994-1, be rescinded immediately; and

BE FURTHER RESOLVED that an Outdoor Burning Ordinance including the appropriate criteria of the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality be adopted and that it replaces Ordinance 1994-1 of the VILLAGE OF ADDISON Governing Ordinances.

- (a) No person shall alter, change, transform, or otherwise vary the edge, bank, or shore of any lake, river, or stream except as provided for inland lakes and streams in part 301 of Public Act No. 451 of 1994 (MCL 324.30101 et seq.).
- (b) If any edge, bank, or shore of any lake, river, or stream is proposed to be altered in any way by any person, that person shall submit to the planning commission a site plan as required in section 42-346. This does not relieve the applicant from complying with requirements of other regulatory agencies.

 (c) No structure shall be placed within 50 25 feet of a lake, river,

or stream.

While not instantly fatal, ingesting of skunk spray can lead to a rare but serious and possibly life-threatening condition called Heinz body anemia.
