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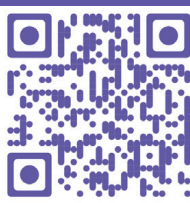
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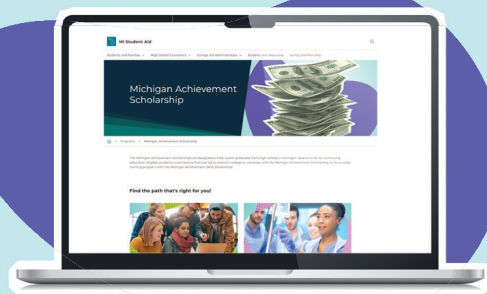

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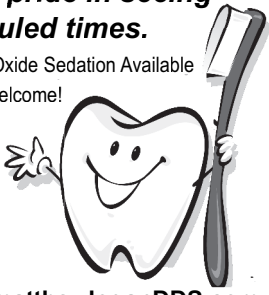
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Racking up wins

'The quality of the rafts was fantastic'

It's an Olympic year and Clark Lake's Raft-O-Rama happened to fall right smack dab in the middle of the Olympics in this year's 63rd anniversary of the big annual event on the beautiful lake. Organizers took it a step further and made sports the theme of Raft-O-Rama 2024 style.

"The quality of the rafts was fantastic," said Joe Collins, chair of the Raft-O-Rama Committee, now going on around 16 years of his involvement with the event. "People really put a lot of effort into this." Collins said there were around 17 rafts that took part in the parade around the lake in front of hundreds of onlookers both on shore and in their boats. As is custom, the rafts com-

peted for a variety of awards ranging from "People's Choice" to "Furthest from the Theme" and everything in between.

"We may not have the quantity we had years ago, but the quality is a lot better," Collins said of the participants in the raft parade.

Raft-O-Rama once again featured the signature chicken dinners complete with corn on the cob grilled, steamed and served up by the Clarklake Lions Club, which is 57 years old this year. The club has been involved with Raft-O-Rama since its beginnings in the early 1960s.

Lions Club member Steve McLear talked about the process of cooking over corn on the cob to feed patrons on site and those who order to go. "What we do is cook the corn on the grill first,"

he explained, noting that several clean aluminum garbage cans are concurrently filled with hot water. "Then we steam them to keep them warm – about a thousand ears of corn." One Lion member's job is to periodically use a blow torch to keep the water hot in the garbage cans.

Any proceeds the Lions make from chicken dinner sales supports their mission and helps those who can't afford eyeglasses and hearing aids. The organization also contributes funds for scholarships for students in area schools.

Raft-O-Rama also featured a silent auction, live music by the popular local band Act III, a 50-50 drawing, and a giant slip-and-slide for the little ones.

Collins said many of the same people and local businesses donate items for

the silent auction every year plus some new donors always chip in.

"We generally every year make a profit," he said. "Our excess money goes back to other things in the community like the Garden Angels, the Spirit Trail, the Brooklyn Food Pantry, and Andy's Angels. It's a wonderful thing. The Lions Club does their usual great job – it's a good time."

Collins also credited Eagle Point Marina & Boat Club for being "fantastic hosts". Blair Huff is owner of the marina as well as the Eagle's Nest Bar & Grill on Clark Lake and Lucero's Mexican Bar & Grill on Jefferson Road. "We've been more than happy with hosting the event – we help them out any way they need it," he said. "The people who participated did a great job – hopefully next year we'll have even more."

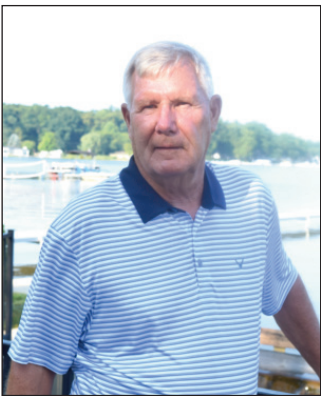

Run Clark Lake brings out over 700 participants

It was a hot, muggy Saturday morning for the 49th annual Run Clark Lake races, but that did not stop over 700 people from participating in the fun tradition with one of the most likeable courses in the state. The races are part of the ORS Race Series. Run Clark Lake features a 12k run, a 5k run, a 5k walk, and a 3/4-mile kids' fun run. The 12k is a USATF certified course. "For those that are actually working towards being a super-competitive runner, this course counts towards those types of races," said Melissa Burgett who helps facilitate the ORS (Orthopedic Rehab Specialists) Race Series. Tyler Landis, 22, of Homer was the overall winner of the 12k and first among all males. Erin O'Carroll, 54, of

Saline won the 12k female race. Aaron Usher, 45, of Lansing, was the top male finisher in the Master category while Crissy Dochoda-Smith was the top female in the Master category. Isaiah Dinverno, 18, of Grass Lake was the overall winner of the 5k and first among all males. Megan Hubbard, 30, of Horton won the 5k female race. Josh Conklin, 41, of Jonesville was the top male finisher in the Master category and Chris Vincent, 60, of Jackson was the top female Master finisher. David Swarts, 59, of Jackson was the top male finisher and overall winner of the 5k walk. Janet Scott, 60, of Horton was the top female finisher. Michael Onkonkowski, 46, of Canton and Laura Dery, 44, of Toledo were the Masters category top finishers for males and

females, respectively. The kids' fun run had a total of 121 participants. (For complete results of all the races, see the website at the end of story.) The total number of all the races' participants pleased Race Director Pat Dwyer. "Before Covid, we were [over 700] most of the time," he stated. "We're getting back up there. We're the biggest race in Jackson County." He attributed the high turnout, in part, to this year being an Olympic year. "Runners all geeked up because the Olympics are on; they train a little bit harder in an Olympic year." He said last year the races had 630 finishers. "I think we have one of the best courses in the state of Michigan," noted Dwyer. "We've been written up in the Detroit News, Detroit Free Press, and Michigan Runner magazine. We've been selected in the top 10 summer races in the state of Michigan and in the top 50 races in the state. We're well-respected around the state. If you look at our course records, they're held by some pretty prestigious people in the running community – not just in the

Jackson area. I'm talking about the United States and the state of Michigan. A lot of excellent runners come through here." Dwyer said the races also attract a lot of first-time runners as well. "It's a great family event with the kids' run, the 5k walk, the 5k run, and the 12k," he noted. "There's a piece of pie for everybody – a little bit of Americana." "This is our largest health and wellness initiative of the 11 races that we host," Burgett said, noting that all the races in the ORS Race Series are in the Greater Jackson area. "The money raised from this race goes toward the maintenance and upkeep of the [Clark Lake Spirit] trail," she added. Angie Warner of Clark Lake did the 5k walk with her daughter, Lydia, and her mother, Patti Kanaan. "We've been coming out to this [race] for over 25 years," she said. 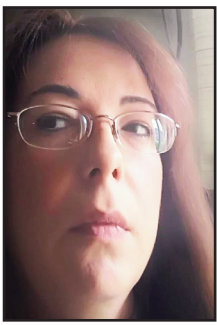

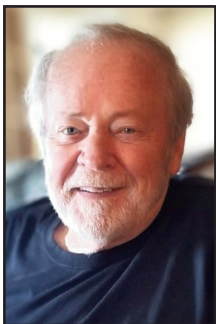

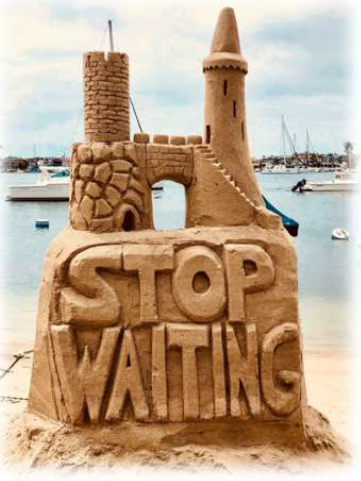
