The Village of Grass Lake has conducted a public hearing on April 7, 2026 at 7:00 pm at 119 N. Lake Street Grass Lake, MI 49240 for the purpose of affording citizens an opportunity to examine and submit comments on the proposed application for a CDBG grant. The Village of Grass Lake proposes to use CDBG grant funds in the amount of \$400,000.00 for rehabilitation of owner-occupied single family homes, including interior and exterior improvements, and \$72,000 for program administration, for a total of \$472,000. All activities, upon completion, will benefit low- to moderate-income households. Zero persons will be displaced as a result of the proposed activities. These funds are intended to benefit the residents of the Village of Grass Lake directly, improving the overall condition of housing in the village. The Village of Grass Lake has not applied for or received CDBG funding in the past, no performance reporting is available. Further information, including a copy of the Village of Grass Lake's Master Plan with housing amendments, and CDBG application is available for review. The Village of Grass Lake submitted a Letter of Intent to apply for the CDBG fund in November, 2025. A full application is in development and the submission due date is May 8, 2026. Citizen views and comments on the proposed application are welcome.

Plaintiff, by their attorney, Frederick Lucas, state:
1. Plaintiff, Guthrie Holdings, LLC (hereafter referred to as "Guthrie"), is a Michigan limited liability company.

2. On June 2, 2003 purchased the following described real property (hereafter referred to as the "Parcel") located in the Township of Columbia, Jackson County, Michigan from Grantor, Leo Haligus (hereafter referred to as "Haligus").
Land in the East half of the Northeast quarter, Section 24, Town 4 South, Range 1 East, Columbia Township, Jackson County, Michigan, described as follows: Commencing at the West quarter corner of Section 19, Town 4 South, Range 2 East; thence North 00°03'19" West along the West line of said Section 19 a distance of 1447.73 feet to the point of beginning of this description; thence North 14°00'51" West 10.00 feet; thence South 89°30'09" West 25.96 feet (recorded as 20.5 ft.) to the Easterly line of Highway M-50; thence Northwesterly along said Highway line 216.05 feet on the arc of a curve to the left, with a radius of 2914.93 feet, a central angle of 04°14'48", and a chord which bears North 15°00'22" West 216.01 feet to the centerline of Goose Creek; thence North 71°17'03" East along said Creek 88.37 feet to the East line of said Section 24; thence) South 00°03'19" West along said Section line 246.47 feet to the point of beginning. 3. In the course of preparing a title search preparatory to Guthrie selling this parcel, it was determined by Prestige Title Company, that at the time that Haligus sold the Parcel to Guthrie, he did not have clear title to the Parcel.

4. As evidenced by the attached letter, in conducting a thorough title search going back to 1925, Prestige Title was unable to identify any person or entity that had legal title to the Parcel. Exhibit B

5. Since 2003 when Haligus deeded the Parcel to Guthrie, Guthrie has paid the taxes on the Parcel for more than 15 years.

6. For a period in excess of statutory 15 year period, Guthrie has treated and continues to treat the Parcel as its own for all purposes, to the exclusion of all other persons.

7. Guthrie's use and possession of the Parcel has been actual, visible, open, notorious, exclusive, continuous, and uninterrupted for more than 15 years, thus satisfying the requirements for adverse possession under Michigan law.

On or about May 21, 2026, the Village of Brooklyn will request the Michigan State Housing Development Authority (MSHDA) to release CDBG funds under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended.

Main St., Brooklyn, MI 49230. All comments received by May 19, 2026, will be considered prior to requesting a release of funds.

ENVIRONMENTAL CERTIFICATION

The Village of Brooklyn certifies to MSHDA that Village of Brooklyn and Matt Swartzlander in his capacity as Village Manager and Certifying Officer, consents to accept the jurisdiction of the Federal Courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to the environmental review process and that these responsibilities have been satisfied. MSHDA's approval of the certification satisfies its responsibilities under NEPA and related laws and authorities and allows the Village of Brooklyn to use HUD Program funds.

OBJECTIONS TO RELEASE OF FUNDS

MSHDA will accept objections to its release of funds and the Grantee's certification for a period of fifteen days following the anticipated submission date or its actual receipt of the request (whichever is later) only if they are on one of the following bases: (a) the certification was not executed by the Certifying Officer of the Grantee; (b) the Certifying Officer has omitted a step or failed to make a decision or finding required by HUD regulations at 24 CFR Part 58; (c) the grant recipient or other participants in the development process has committed funds or incurred costs not authorized by 24 CFR Part 58 before approval of a release of funds by MSHDA; or (d) another Federal agency acting pursuant to 40 CFR Part 1504 has submitted a written finding that the project is unsatisfactory from the standpoint of environmental quality. Objections must be prepared and submitted in accordance with the required procedures (24 CFR Part 58, Sec. 58.76) and can be sent via email to mshda-cdbg@michigan.gov or through the mail, addressed to MSHDA - CDBG, 735 East Michigan Avenue, Lansing, MI 48912. Potential objectors should contact MSHDA to verify the actual last day of the objection period.

Program funds will be used to undertake a project known as Village of Brooklyn Homeowner Rehabilitation Program for the purpose of Homeowner Rehabilitation to assist eligible homeowners with rehab activities that will address health, safety and structural concerns. These include roof and siding repair, updates to plumbing and electrical systems, remediation of lead paint and mold hazards, foundation stabilization and energy efficiency improvements. The activities proposed are categorically excluded under HUD regulations at 24 CFR Part 58 from National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) requirements.

Estimated Project Cost: \$472,000.00

The Tier I broad assessment of the project area revealed no serious environmental adverse impacts for: Clean Air Act, Coastal Zone Management, Wild & Scenic Rivers, and Coastal Barrier Resources.

Tier II site-specific environmental analyses will be conducted as project sites are identified and will include the following factors: Endangered Species, Floodplain Management, Noise Abatement/Control, Environmental Justice, Explosive & Flam. Operations, Historic Pres. SHPO, Wetlands Protection, Cont. & Toxic Substances, Farmlands Protection, Historic Pres. Tribal, Airport Hazards, and Flood Insurance.
